CAPSA'S SERVICE AREA



CAPSA is a nonprofit domestic violence, sexual assault and rape recovery center serving Cache Valley and the Bear Lake area. Last year, CAPSA sheltered 271 men, women and children fleeing abuse and provides support services to 1,927 individuals.

CAPSA has locations to meet and provide FREE and confidential services in Logan, Garden City, Randolph, Franklin and Preston.







LETTER FROM JILL ANDERSON CAPSA'S CEO and Executive Director

To all of our donors, community leaders and volunteers - thank you for your support. This work is only possible because of the support of our community.

The issues of domestic violence and sexual abuse are scary, complicated and far more

prevalent than most people realize. In Utah, 1 in 3 women and 1 in 7 men will experience domestic violence and/or sexual abuse in their lifetime. Because of your support, each year, CAPSA is able to quietly and expertly support thousands of individuals and families escape the clutches of abuse, start new lives with hope, and heal from the associated trauma.

Thank you for supporting this life-saving and life-changing work.

In the last two years, CAPSA has grown our office, shelter and housing to meet the increasing needs of survivors. In June 2022, CAPSA completed the final phase of a major building addition, which added 16 program offices, created four group rooms, tripled our children's services area, and added a physically accessible room in our shelter. During this same period, CAPSA built a second neighborhood, expanding CAPSA's housing to 21 homes.

This growth increases CAPSA's ability to serve survivors. Just as important, the funding of these projects reflects the compassion our community has for the individuals and families we serve. I am always in awe by the generosity of our community – thank you.

Finally, as we look forward, we again need our community's support to grow CAPSA's next strategic need – our endowment.

When you donate to an endowment, your donation is invested (not spent). CAPSA then uses the dividends generated to fund programs. By making an endowed donation, you are making a perpetual gift that will ensure future survivors have access to CAPSA's services. I am excited to see how our community rallies around this strategic need and helps CAPSA raise the funds to ensure future sustainability.

CAPSA'S SUPPORT

CAPSA supports individuals who have experienced domestic violence, rape and/or sexual assault. Our wrap-around services help individuals and families escape abuse and heal.

EMERGENCY SHELTER

CAPSA provides a safe place for individuals and/or families escaping domestic violence and/or sexual abuse. CAPSA sheltered women (140), men (21) and their accompanied children (110) for an average of 26 days.

SUPPORTING OUR COMMUNITY

CLINICAL THERAPY

CAPSA clinical therapists are trauma-informed experts in treating anxiety, depression and other disorders associated with abuse. CAPSA offers free and confidential clinical therapy for adults, teens and children.

SUPPORT GROUPS

CAPSA offers support, educational and therapy groups for victims of domestic violence and sexual abuse. Groups create a safe place to learn, process and heal while developing a peer-based support network.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

CAPSA offers a transitional housing program and housing assistance funding to provide a safe place for survivors to live while beginning a new life without abuse. CAPSA provided housing to 89 households, which includes 96 adults and 123 children.

EDUCATION AND PREVENTION

CAPSA's awareness educators present curriculum promoting healthy relationships, reducing risk factors, increasing protective factors and bringing awareness to CAPSA's services. Participants include 16,100 youth and 2,357 adults.

CASEWORK AND ADVOCACY -

Caseworkers focus on helping survivors to become and stay safe by removing tangible barriers that may cause someone to return to an abusive relationship.

CAPSA's caseworkers encourage self-determination and help survivors build plans based on their goals; this includes building safety plans, completing protective orders, attending court, advocating with law enforcement, navigating cultural barriers, identifying and securing resources and making connections to other services and agencies.

In FY22, CAPSA made 2,834 referrals for 1047 survivors to 64 community partners including BRAG, Cache Community Food Pantry, Workforce Services, medical providers and for legal consultations.

In FY22, CAPSA prepared 141 orders of protection, which include: 102 domestic violence protective orders, 2 dating violence protective orders, 20 civil staking injunctions, 16 child protective orders and 1 sexual assault protective order.

CRISIS/SUPPORT PHONE LINE

CAPSA is available 24/7 to provide support and resources to victims of domestic violence and/or sexual assault and their support network. CAPSA's support line is (435) 753-2500 and operated by trauma-informed trained staff.

In FY22, CAPSA answered 7,848 crisis calls for a total of 48,330 minutes.





EMERGENCY SHELTER-

CAPSA's emergency shelter is a 34-bed homeless shelter for survivors of domestic violence and sexual abuse. While in shelter, individuals and families meet daily with shelter caseworkers to create safety plans and develop/complete personalized action plans. Action plans are based on the survivor's goals and often include finding safe and affordable housing, obtaining employment, securing protective orders, and supporting children's social, physical and emotional needs, etc.

In FY22, CAPSA sheltered 271 individuals (140 women, 21 men and 110 accompanied children) for a total 5,857 nights (average of 22). While in shelter, individuals met on an average of 17 times with their caseworker.

SHELTER ADDITION

Phase two of our building addition included updating our emergency shelter by adding two offices and an accessible suite on the main floor (which added two beds to our shelter). This was completed in June 2022. More about the building addition info on page 21.

CLINICAL THERAPY

CAPSA provides **FREE** therapy for individuals who have experienced trauma from abuse. CAPSA's therapists are licensed clinical therapists who specialize in providing trauma-informed mental health services for survivors of domestic violence, sexual abuse and secondary victims. CAPSA offers in person or remote therapy via phone or online.

CAPSA provides the following evidence based modalities:


- EMDR (Eye Movement Desensitization Reprocessing)
- CBT (Cognitive Behavioral Therapy)
- TF-CBT (Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy)
- DBT (Dialectical Behavioral Therapy)
- Play Therapy
- MBB (Mind Body Bridging)
- Art Therapy

Clinical therapy supports survivors who are experiencing, though not limited to, PTSD (Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder), personality disorder, dissociation, anxiety, depression and childhood trauma.

In FY22, CAPSA provided clinical therapy to 525 individuals for 4,055 hours (3,594 clinical therapy hours and 461 therapeutic advocacy hours) with 75% of sessions held in person.

SECONDARY SURVIVORS

Therapy is also available to family members or friends who may need therapy support as a result of trauma from witnessing abuse or supporting a survivor.



CRISIS INTERVENTION – CAPSA therapists provide crisis intervention for any survivor working with a caseworker. Crisis intervention helps survivors develop skills necessary to reduce severe, overwhelming and debilitating symptoms of trauma.

TREATMENT – The survivor's caseworker will make a referral to a CAPSA therapist. The caseworker will continue to assist the survivor with ongoing support. If there is a waiting list, with CAPSA, you will not wait alone or feel unsupported.

CAPSA'S CLINICAL THERAPY IS TOTALLY FREE – CAPSA does not charge insurance or require co-pays; this is to ensure safety, remove any barriers to treatment and not limit treatment plans. CAPSA makes emotional healing easily accessible.

CAPSA HOUSING

Domestic violence is the number one contributor to homelessness for women, and while CAPSA's emergency shelter is critical in diverting homelessness, eliminating homelessness requires an integrated approach to empowering individuals and families find and maintain safe and stable homes.

CAPSA's housing program is among the best in the State of Utah and is a national model for transitional housing programs.

Transitional housing is available to clients for up to two years and incorporates housing subsidies (scattered site) with ongoing advocacy, practical skill development, community building and educational support. Because many victims of domestic violence face increased barriers to housing, CAPSA has built and secured 21 homes, providing additional housing and support for families.

In FY22, CAPSA provided housing to 89 households or 219 individuals (96 adults and 123 children).

CAPSA works to prevent abuse through community education and awareness. Educators present topics linked to healthy relationships in middle and high schools, and to community groups. CAPSA sponsors a youth council in all of the local high schools creating peer-based education.

In FY22, CAPSA provided 949 presentations to 18,457 participants.



FUNDING PRIORITY - ENDOWMENT

WHAT IS AN ENDOWMENT

An endowment is a permanent, self-sustaining source of funding. Endowment funds are restricted (not spent) and invested, which generate dividends to support CAPSA programs. An endowment provides stability and ensures CAPSA's future financial health - allowing CAPSA to weather funding crises, which may include future pandemics and/or funding insecurity, such as a loss of a grant.

THE NEED

CAPSA's programs are funded primarily by competitive grants, which are not guaranteed - grants require reapplying every one to two years and may not renew. Since most grants fund multiple positions across departments, when grants don't renew, CAPSA is forced to end program(s) and let staff go, hurting survivors.



NAMED ENDOWMENT

Named endowments are created with an initial donation of \$1,000,000 or the intent for multiple donations to exceed \$1,000,000. Until a named endowment reaches \$500,000, it will be managed in the primary fund and the purpose will remain unrestricted. The contributions will be tracked and reported as an account note.

Please note: A named endowment under \$500,000 that does not receive new contributions for more than five years, at the board's discretion, can be unrecognized and rolled into the primary endowment fund.

CAPSA'S ENDOWMENT

CAPSA's programs are well developed and staffed by experts who provide life-saving and life-changing advocacy and support to our clients. An endowed gift supports programs today and in the future

CAPSA's endowment goal is \$15,000,000 - the intent of this goal is to diversify CAPSA's funding so that 15% of the total operating revenue is generated by our endowment.

CAPSA's Endowment balance at printing is \$1,003,578.


