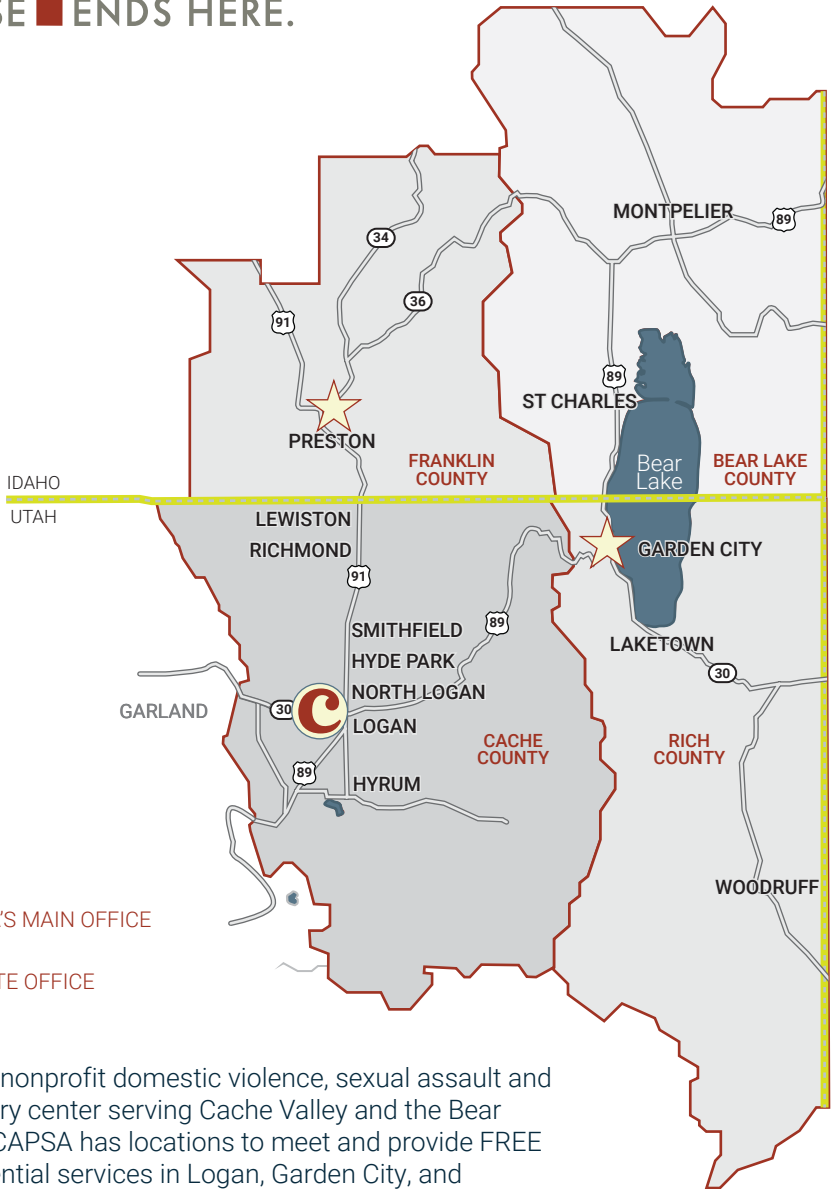

Fifty years ago, a small but determined group of community members came together to support survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault. What began as a simple crisis hotline, staffed by volunteers, quickly grew as the need for safety, shelter, and advocacy became undeniable. From those early days, CAPSA has evolved into a nationally recognized leader in supporting individuals and families across Northern Utah and Southeast Idaho.

This milestone is a testament to the power of community. CAPSA has never stood alone, it has always been a reflection of the generosity, compassion, and commitment of the people who believe in our mission. Because of you, CAPSA is not just an organization; it is a lifeline.

Every day, we see the impact of your support. Last year alone, CAPSA served over 2,400 individuals, providing emergency shelter, transitional housing, therapy, and advocacy to those seeking safety and healing. Our prevention education efforts reached over 17,000 people, helping to create a future where fewer individuals experience the trauma of abuse. These numbers are more than statistics—they represent real people whose lives have been forever changed because CAPSA was here, and because you chose to stand with us.

THE STRENGTH TO REACH OUT

She never thought she would need CAPSA.

In high school, she was a leader, raising awareness and ensuring others knew where to find help. But she had felt that that was for someone else, never for her. Years later, she realized how wrong she had been.

A LIFE SHE NEVER EXPECTED

Her relationship began with love and laughter. Slowly, the criticisms and control crept in, shrinking her world until she felt totally alone.

She often thought about CAPSA but believed they couldn't help with something so complicated. Until she saw the sign.

The words spoke directly to her: she mattered, help was real, and she didn't have to figure this out alone. She took a deep breath, dialed the number, and whispered the truth of her life for the first time.



The voice on the other end reassured her: "We believe you! We can help you!"

THE FIRST TIME SHE FELT SAFE IN YEARS

CAPSA's advocate assessed her danger and helped her prepare to leave. A few days later, home alone, she packed a small bag and walked away, straight into the safety of CAPSA's shelter. For the first time in years, she slept without fear.

REBUILDING, THEN BREAKING AGAIN

With a caseworker, she built a plan for her future. She had a job, resources, and hope until she discovered her husband had taken out credit cards in her name, leaving her with debt and a wrecked credit score. Without housing options, she feared she'd have to go back.



A PLACE TO LAND, A PLACE TO RISE

But CAPSA doesn't just offer safety, it builds futures. Because of community support, CAPSA operates 21 homes for survivors like her. Instead of returning to her abuser, she moved into one of them.

With the assistance of COACH funds she was able to purchase a brand new bed and sofa, as well as receive legal support to navigate filing for a divorce, and pay down credit card debt. Her life was changed because a community cared.

A FUTURE SHE NEVER THOUGHT POSSIBLE

She had once spread awareness about CAPSA. Now, she knows firsthand. CAPSA didn't just help someone. They helped her.

A FATHER'S STRENGTH

His daughter had been pulling away for months, canceled visits, unanswered calls, and an ever-growing wall between them. He told himself it was normal, that life was just busy, that she'd come around. But deep down, he knew something wasn't right.

Then, one night, she was there. Standing on his front porch, her daughter clutching her hand.

"I need help. I don't know where else to go."

Her voice was small, uncertain, like she wasn't sure she was even allowed to ask for help. He pulled them inside, reassuring her that she was safe.

SEARCHING FOR ANSWERS

He knew she needed protection, so he gently suggested they go to law enforcement, but she shook her head, terrified of what might happen. He didn't push.

He thought of CAPSA. Months earlier, his company had hosted a training on domestic violence and how CAPSA can help.

He brought it up, carefully, offering it as a next step. But she wasn't ready.

So, he made a different choice. If she wasn't ready to go to CAPSA, he would go for her.





BECOMING HIS DAUGHTER'S ADVOCATE

Walking through CAPSA's doors, he felt an odd mix of determination and uncertainty. The caseworker listened. And then, piece by piece, they laid out the steps.

They also talked about what she wasn't ready for yet and how to help her get there.

For the next several weeks, he kept coming back. Meeting with a CAPSA's caseworker, learning everything he could so that when his daughter was ready, he could say: "I know what to do. I've got you."

Slowly, her walls came down. She started asking questions. She started trusting the process. And eventually, one day, she asked if she could come with him to CAPSA.

A FATHER'S OWN HEALING

Watching his daughter rebuild her life was both heartbreaking and hopeful. He had spent so long trying to be strong for her. As he watched her take back control of her life, he realized he was hurting too.

The guilt of not seeing the signs. The shame of believing he should have done more. The rage toward the man who had stolen so much from her. He started recognizing his own pain.

After a meeting with the caseworker about his daughter, he admitted what he was feeling. The caseworker listened, then said something that changed everything.

"You are a survivor too."

He blinked, startled by the words. Him? A survivor? But the more he thought about it, the more it made sense.



Secondary survivors carry their own form of trauma. They live with guilt, grief, and helplessness, watching someone they love suffer and feeling powerless to stop it.

He had to learn how to heal, so he started meeting with a CAPSA therapist. Through those sessions, he learned to forgive himself for what he didn't know, to process the anger, and to let go of the helplessness.

A FAMILY REBUILT WITH CAPSA'S SUPPORT

His daughter is thriving now. With CAPSA's help, she secured a protective order, found employment, and is building a new life free from abuse. His granddaughter is smiling more, laughing again, learning what safety and stability truly feel like.

And for him? He is still a father. Still her protector. But he has also allowed himself to be a man who needed help too.

CAPSA didn't just help his daughter. They helped him find his own strength again.

A PATH TO FREEDOM

For years, she felt trapped.

Law enforcement knew her home well because officers had responded multiple times to domestic disputes. Each time, they asked if she was ready to leave. Each time, she wasn't, because leaving felt impossible.

In rural Idaho, her world was small. The abuse was suffocating, but so was the idea of stepping into the unknown with no safety net.

Each time an officer came, she made the same decision: to stay. Because, as so many survivors understand, staying is often the safest option.

AN UNEXPECTED LIFELINE

After an injury, she found herself at Franklin County Medical Center, where law enforcement met her once again.

Then, through the hospital lobby, a CAPSA staff member walked in.

The officer immediately recognized the name badge and pointed, "You need to talk to her. She can help!"

For the first time, there was someone in that room whose whole job was to help her.

A PLAN, A PATH, A WAY FORWARD

CAPSA's caseworkers, traveling from Logan, Utah, to Franklin County, met with her to talk through orders of protection. Together they started to create a step-by-step written

safety plan. And every time she wrote something down; what to pack, where to go, who to call, her future felt less impossible.

"For so many survivors, just seeing a written plan makes the difference," one CAPSA caseworker reflected. "It turns fear into action. It makes leaving feel real."

With the support of COACH Funds she was able to move across town into a new, safe home that was just hers and not marked by memories of the abuse.

A FUTURE MADE POSSIBLE BY CAPSA'S EXPANSION

Today, she is still healing, but she is free.

She continues working with CAPSA and is enrolled in CAPSA's clinical therapy. She is slowly rediscovering who she is outside of survival mode.

And she isn't alone.

Because of CAPSA's expansion into Idaho, she had an advocate in her community when she needed one the most.

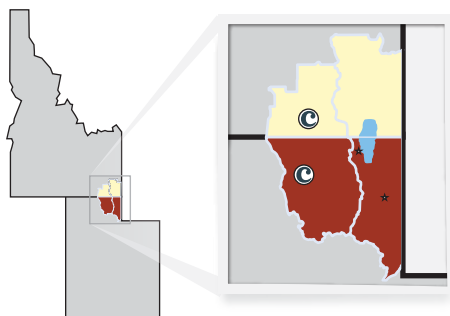

For 50 years, CAPSA has provided life-saving services to survivors of domestic and sexual violence. Survivors in Franklin and Bear Lake Counties already have full access to CAPSA's comprehensive programs—including crisis support, case management, therapy, and legal advocacy—through our Logan campus.

To strengthen our impact and better serve Idaho survivors, CAPSA is expanding its presence with a dedicated, full-time staff member in Franklin County in FY26. This employee will bring critical resources directly to the community, enhancing access and ensuring local survivors receive the immediate support they need.

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A CRITICAL STEP: TRANSITIONAL HOUSING IN IDAHO

A safe place to live is essential for survivors escaping abuse. To meet this urgent need, CAPSA is working to secure a fourplex in Preston that will serve as both transitional housing and emergency shelter.

This fourplex will provide survivors and families in Franklin County with immediate refuge, reducing barriers to safety and long-term stability. One unit will be dedicated to emergency shelter for individuals in crisis, while the remaining units will offer survivors the space and support needed to rebuild their lives.



This fourplex in Preston, Idaho is available to CAPSA for \$1 million.

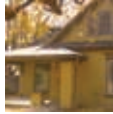

ENDOWMENTS AT CAPSA

WHAT IS AN ENDOWMENT

An endowment is a permanent, self-sustaining source of funding. Endowment funds are restricted (not spent) and invested, which generate dividends to support CAPSA programs. An endowment provides stability and ensures CAPSA's future financial health - allowing CAPSA to weather funding crises, which may include future pandemics and/or funding insecurity, such as a loss of a grant.

THE NEED

CAPSA's programs are funded primarily by competitive grants, which are not guaranteed - grants require reapplying every one to two years and may not renew. Since most grants fund multiple positions across departments, when grants don't renew, CAPSA is forced to end program(s) and let staff go, hurting survivors.

CAPSA'S ENDOWMENT

CAPSA's programs are well developed and staffed by experts who provide life-saving and life-changing advocacy and support to our clients. An endowed gift supports programs today and in the future.

CAPSA's endowment goal is \$15,000,000 - this goal will diversify CAPSA's funding so that 15% of the total operating revenue or \$600,000 is generated by our endowment to support programs and business operations.

NAMED ENDOWMENT

Named endowments are created with an initial donation of \$1,000,000 or the intent for multiple donations to exceed \$1,000,000. Until a named endowment reaches \$500,000, it will be managed in the primary fund and the purpose will remain unrestricted. The contributions will be tracked and reported as an account note.

Please note: A named endowment under \$500,000 that does not receive new contributions for more than five years, at the board's discretion, can be unrecognized and rolled into the primary endowment fund.

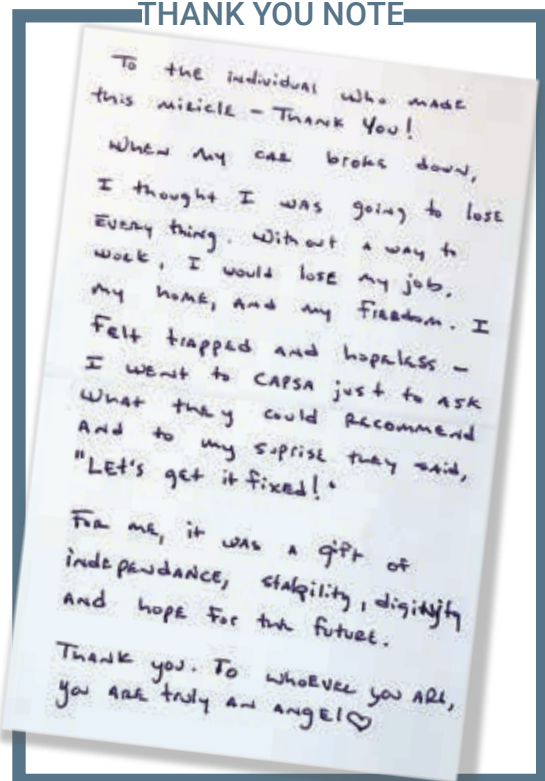
